From the Rabbi's Study...


Dear Chaverim,



enter January, which in our part of the world is usually the coldest month of the year. Our short days are followed by long nights (about 15 hours pass between sunset and sunrise the next day), which are believed to be the



source of SAD, Seasonal Affective Disorder. This disorder affects a large segment of the population, especially during the winter. Short days and cold weather cause many people to remain indoors longer than during the rest of the year. This can result in sleeping more than normal, having little to no energy, and even overeating. In short, serious depression can occur, resulting in one's inability to function fully and normally. It is an undeniable malady which afflicts many people each year.

Treatment for SAD usually includes medication, light therapy, and ionized-air administration in which charged particles are released into the sleep environment.

I would like to suggest another treatment for SAD. Why not make Temple Israel activities a regular part of your winter (and all year round, for that matter) routine? Being together as a community and sharing in the spiritual, educational, and social activities that Temple Israel offers can be a quick and easy remedy for the dark cold days of winter! While it may not fully cure any underlying clinical depression, it sure can make these cold, short days not only more tolerable, but even fulfilling and enjoyable!

President's Message



One day at the USCJ Convention... So much learned!

Thanks to Jeff Salloway and his new position as Northeast District Chair, I had the opportunity to attend the United Synagogue convention on Monday, December 9th. This intense, meaningful, and somewhat overwhelming experience included hours of traffic, fascinating learning sessions, a delicious lunch, networking galore, and even a reunion with an old friend who is now a rabbi.

Hoping to attend an 8:45 am session, I left my house at 6:30 and battled the traffic to Boston that so many people negotiate on a daily basis. I made it, barely, to "Recruitment and Retention" at 8:45. I got a seat just in time, as this session was so well attended that it became standing room only and attendees spilled into the hallway outside of the conference room. Three rabbis shared their stories of attracting members to their congregations, and more importantly, keeping them engaged. For these three rabbis, recruitment and retention are one and the same. One rabbi uses a text messaging system to remind different affinity groups of programs. One rabbi has a system where three congregants are needed to make most programs happen, and he has cut red tape to streamline planning and executing programs of interest. One rabbi handed out a bound copy of all the programs his synagogue executed this year... over one hundred of them!

The biggest takeaway for me was that programming needs to happen both inside and outside the walls of the synagogue. My goal is to create some events that occur out in the community, whether at a museum, or a park, or a restaurant. How about a beer tour and tasting at a local brewery? Or what about a TIP running group with a 5K in the spring as an end goal? Are you interested in helping to plan some-

thing new and outside of the box? Let me know!

I attended a plenary session called "Managing Difficult Conversations." A Harvard Law School professor who studies negotiations gave an entertaining and interactive lecture about what happens during a challenging conversation and how both one's inner and outer voices are part of any conversation. I learned a great deal about what makes a conversation feel productive and caring.

Additional sessions included a lunch table discussion on Ritual Change, an interesting session on dues models in history and how they inform the present day, and a session about a new USCJ program designed for interfaith families that is currently being piloted. In between, I spent time browsing vendor tables, (piles of books for the taking at the PJ Library table was my obvious favorite), seeing people from my past, and meeting new colleagues. Mostly, I took in the legitimate excitement that arises from so much positive energy in one place.

My final afternoon lecture was one that included a roundtable discussion and debate about the Conservative movement's view on officiating interfaith marriages. This topic is clearly one the movement is wrestling with as we try to be as inclusive as possible while acting within the confines of Jewish law. Though two rabbis took opposing viewpoints, as happens in Judaism generation after generation, their caring and passion for their position was front and center. I drove home, tired but energized, and thankful that we are part of a movement filled with thoughtful, reflective, and innovative rabbis and lay leaders. I am still sifting through the information that I gleaned from the day, and I am looking forward to

The Ritual Committee helped plan the visit of rabbinical candidate Rabba Kaya Stern-Kaufman the weekend after the convention. It was wonderful to see the sanctuary full of congregants for both Kabbalat Shabbat and Saturday morning services and to hear from many people throughout the weekend what they liked or didn't like about her davening, teaching, and positions on issues important to them.

I am most proud that the Ritual Committee planned and pulled off three well-attended, successful events during the week of Hanukkah. Thanks to everyone who made time during a school vacation week to participate!

On the first night of Hanukkah, over 100 people gathered to listen to prayers for peace, light the first candle, and sing and eat at our annual Interfaith Prayer for Peace Candle Lighting event. Rabbi Korinow coordinated the participation of a number of clergy from our neighboring houses and communities of worship. A huge thank you to

Margie Wachtel for rallying the Membership Committee to provide food and drink that night to supplement the munchkin sufganiyot that Ritual Committee member Ben Martindale brought from a kosher Dunkin Donuts in Brooklyn! *Rav todot* (many thanks) to all who helped, especially Laura Sher who was front and center, preparing and serving a generous array of treats.

On the third night of Hanukkah, over 25 people came together to light candles, sing, and dine, enjoying a delicious five-dish Chinese banquet prepared in our own TIP kitchen by chef Jeffrey Salloway and sous-chefs Jennifer Beard and Fred Feldman. Everyone pitched in, either helping with food prep or clean up after the meal. Jeffrey and Jen planned, shopped, and masterminded the event, which we hope will become an annual tradition. *Kol Hakavod* to Jeffrey and his many cheerful and capable assistants!

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

From Veronica's announcement of her pregnancy, and



Hanukkah Candle Lighting and Prayer for Peace







FINDING YOUR FAMILY: FROM BEGINNING TO ADVANCED JEWISH GENEALOGY

A presentation on Jewish Genealogy will be given by Dr. Fred Feldman at Temple Israel on Sunday, January 5, 2020 from 2 to 4 pm. Dr. Feldman and his family immigrated to the United States as Holocaust survivors and arrived in N.Y. in 1949. He has been documenting his family history and genealogy for over 50 years.

The presentation will cover getting started recording your personal genealogy / family history, how to construct your family tree, the choices available on recording and storing it, as well as choices on using computer software packages. Options and benefits will be discussed for using internet resources such as Ancestry.com, Geni.com, or the Mormon (LDS) Family History Library. Examples of data and family trees obtained, both from the U.S. and Europe will be shown and, given time, integration of packages with digital and photographic media.



After the question and answer session, Dr. Feldman is also offering to digitally scan photographs of historical family value for attendees who bring them. Preferred photo size is 4 x 6 inches or smaller. After scanning, the

photographs will be returned to the owners immediately. The computer file of the scans can be copied onto a USB thumb drive, which participants should bring. (Staples is a good source; thumb drives can be purchased for \$14 or less.)

The scans on the thumb drives can then be used for

loading to personal computers, printing in various sizes and formats, and/or emailing.
