From the Rabbi's Study...

Dear Chaverim,

It has always fascinated me that as we conclude the serious-minded High Holy Days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we are already put into gear to celebrate one of our three major pilgrimage festivals, Sukkot. In fact, it is customary among some to put the first nail into building the sukkah even before one has broken the Yom Kippur fast. Sukkot, which begins only five days after Yom Kippur, celebrates the last harvest of the season and it reminds us of the frail booths that our ancestors dwelled in during their forty years in the wilderness after escaping from Egyptian slavery.

Imagine... just five days after we have expressed our desire to atone for our wrongdoings and, of course, not knowing into which book our lots are



Rabbi's Message

written for the coming year, we are commanded to celebrate Sukkot. Sukkot has several names, among them *Chag Ha-asif*, the Festival of Gathering the Harvest and *Z'man Simchateinu*, the Season of our Joy. In rabbinic



literature going back 2,000 years, the rabbis simply referred to Sukkot as *Heh-chag*, The Holiday, as if to say it is THE holiday, par excellence.

In the minds of the rabbis, Sukkot expresses the essence of what it means to be a Jew. It is a time of giving thanks for the "harvest" that we enjoy... i.e. the blessings that we have in our lives. After all, the word for "Jew" derives from the name Judah, or *Yehudah* in Hebrew. *Yehudah* comes from the same root as the Hebrew word *l'hodot*, which means "to give thanks," or as we were taught in Hebrew School to always say *todah*, "thank you" when someone has given you something nice or done something nice for you. Being "Jewish" means being tuned in to "expressing gratitude" for the blessings we have. Sukkot reminds us of what being Jewish literally means!

For this reason, many observant Jews make sure



they recite at least 100 blessings each day! This is one way to express one's identity each and every hour of the day.

Of course, one should not have the opportunity to express thanks only on Sukkot. Attending the Shabbat evening service, the Shabbat morning service and the weekly Tuesday afternoon *minyan* gives us the opportunity to express thanks as a community. Being together to pray, to study, or just to socialize infuses us with the sense of community and gratitude which ignites good feelings about being Jewish.

May we continue our Jewish commitment to "live up to our name" throughout the year and may we share our sense of gratitude for who we are by living up to the ideals of our faith.

Sukkot Traditions and Open House at the Hyetts' Sukkah

I didn't anticipate that Sukkot would become one of my family's favorite holidays, complete with traditions, annual parties, and boxes of decorations. In May 2012, at the temple's spring event comedy night, Brian and I bid impulsively on the "Judaica" auction item, which included a variety of items such as gift cards, a stained glass Star of David, and an IOU for Russ Bernstein to help us acquire the materials for a sukkah of our own.

That quick decision on the auction floor has given our family the holiday of Sukkot. That first fall, Brian and Russ took a trip to Home Depot and came home with a vast pile of wood and hardware, and they constructed our sukkah together. Around that time, my nephew Zach was born, and after visiting him and my sister at Beth Israel in Boston we took a quick detour on our way home and double-parked outside the Israel Book Shop. I ran inside to pick up as many sukkah decorations as I could hold. Some of them only lasted one season, but every year, we use most of our plastic fruit garlands from that initial trip.

There are so many things that I love about our observance of Sukkot. First of all, it is one of the only occasions I can think of where our family works together to build something out of wood and screws. My girls have learned how to use a drill and they play an active role in the job. It is incredibly rewarding to build an actual structure. (It is less rewarding to have to take it down after the holiday and put it away for a year, but it's worth it!) We all enjoy the moment when we bring up our burgeoning box of sukkah decorations from the basement and decorate our sukkah together. My kids get a taste of what it must be like for the rest of the world to

decorate a Christmas tree. Each year our sukkah looks a little different, but we always love it. Most of all, we love having a reason to be outside and to eat outside. The air has that perfect fall crispness and the trees are still hanging onto their leaves. We make a point to eat in the sukkah as much as we can.

We love hosting friends and family in our sukkah, and it is fun to have holiday traditions that we share with others.

In that spirit, this year I'd like to invite our temple community to an open house at the Hyett sukkah, weather permitting. Please come by between 1:30 - 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, October 20, for some snacks and to visit with others in our backyard.

our House Committee, she just started her second two-year term as VP of House.



Trip to Israel




