Radiating Peace- Hanukkah 2021

This Hanukkah, stroll by the Temple on any night and you will see a lit menorah in the very top window of our sanctuary radiating its light out onto the streets of Portsmouth. This practice of placing one's menorah in a window derives from the Jewish law that the miracle of Hanukkah should be

publicized in the world. This is known as *pirsumei nisa*, which means to publicize the miracle.

In Maimonides' legal code, the *Mishna Torah*, he discusses the question of what one should do on the Friday night of Hanukkah if one only has enough oil to light either Shabbat candles or

Hanukkah candles. Which mitzvah should take precedence; the mitzvah of lighting Shabbat candles or the mitzvah of *pirsumei nisa*, publicizing the miracle of Hanukkah?

Maimonides gives the following answer: The lamp for one's home [Shabbat] receives priority, since it generates peace within the home...Peace is great, for the entire Torah was given to bring about peace within the world, as states: 'Its ways are pleasant and all its paths are peace.' [Proverbs 3:17]



Whereas the mitzvah of Shabbat candles is rooted in the value of creating peace in the home (*shalom bayit*) and generating a spiritual light within the family, the mitzvah of Hanukkah lights is to radiate that inner light outward into the world.

Maimonides naturally concludes that one must first generate a peaceful light within before it can be shared with the greater world. Tova Hartman, a contemporary Jewish scholar, comments on this teaching: Maimonides urges us to realize that this value of peace in the home is primary. Only when we attain shalom bayit can we hope to bring that inner light, outwards – we must first have peace in our own domains and personal relationships before we can hope to bring a meaningful light and true peace to the world at large.

This year as we light the Hanukkah candles, let us all consider how we might advance peace within

our own homes and within our Temple Israel relationships. How might each one of us magnify our precious community's light from within and spread a greater sense of welcoming and peace into the winter darkness?

President's Message



Dear Fellow Congregants,
Hanukkah celebrates the
rededication of the Holy
Temple in Jerusalem following
the Maccabean revolt against
the Seleucid Empire in the 2nd
century BCE. We are now in a
position where we, like our
ancestors over two thousand
years ago, need to rededicate

ourselves to our temple. Although we have not suffered the physical destruction of our temple as our ancestors did, we have in the past two years seen many of our norms destroyed. Now we must rededicate ourselves to rebuilding those norms within our community.

We experienced a significant loss of students in our religious school as a result of the pandemic. Now, under the leadership of Rabba Kaya and our Education Committee, we have revamped the curriculum and we are dedicating ourselves to reestablishing our religious school as a central part of our temple community where we educate the next generation. If you have school-age children who are not participating in our religious school I urge you to contact Ian Kaner, our VP Education, to discuss what we might be able to do so that your child can take advantage of the opportunity for a Jewish education.

Similarly, in-person attendance at services has suffered. Initially, we suspended in-person services, but now with people being able to attend in person, we still have a number of people who are more comfortable attending via Zoom. We must dedicate ourselves to finding ways to ensure that everyone is comfortable attending services and other temple activities in person. If you would like to feel more comfortable attending in-person services and events at our temple, I urge you to contact Fran Berman, VP Ritual, to discuss what we might be

able to do to allow you to feel more comfortable .

In addition to the drop in participation in religious school and services, we have also experienced a drop in committee participation, which is where most of the important planning and execution of temple activities takes place. Each of us needs to rededicate ourselves to being a participant on a temple committee to rebuild the strength of our community. If you are currently an active committee member, I offer my heartfelt thanks. And if you are in the position of wanting to rededicate yourself to the sustainment and improvement of our temple, but aren't sure where your talents might best be used, please contact our Administrative Director, Heather Tomlinson, or Rabba Kaya, or me, and we will assist you in identifying the place where your help might be most rewarding to you as well as beneficial to our temple.

Finally, I would be remiss if I did not include a few words about *tzedakah*. We learn the following from *Pirkei Avot* (Teaching of the Sages).

There are four types among those who give *tzedakah*:

- those who want to give but do not want others to give — they begrudge their fellow human beings the mitzvah;
- those who want others to give but refuse themselves to give — they are miserly;
- those who want to give and also want others to give
 they are saintly;
- those who do not want others to give and themselves do not give — they are scoundrels.

I hope that we all are typed as saintly by giving *tzedakah* in the form of a contribution to our Annual Appeal.

Hanukkah Lights and Fun

December is a month of darkness and light. The hours of daylight are brief and precious as the winter solstice arrives, and evening starts way too soon. This is the season when we crave light, and Judaism meets that need during the eight nights of Hanukkah. Each member of the family is encouraged to have and light their own hanukkiyah (Hanukkah menorah), and the resulting display can be very bright indeed!

On the first night of the holiday, we use the *shamash* to light a single candle in the *hanukkiyah*, and then each night we add one more until the final night featuries eight blazing candles. On the first night, we recite three blessings as we light the candles. On the rest of the nights, only two blessings are recited. If you need a refresher course in candle lighting or a copy of the blessings, both are available on the temple website.

Once lit, the *hanukkiyah* is employed to publicize the miracle of Hanukkah, so, if possible, it should be positioned near a window facing out toward the street, where others can see its light. I usually put my *hanukkiyah* in my front bay window, where the neighbors can see it. For many years, my neighbor Marge used to tell me how much she looked forward to seeing the flickering lights in my window.

After we kindle the Hanukkah candles, we sit and watch them until they burn out, usually in 30-40 minutes. This is not only a religious command, but also a good safety rule! The Hanukkah candles are not meant to be utilitarian – they should not be the only light in the room, and work is prohibited while

the candles are burning. Instead, this is a time to sit, tell stories, play dreidel or other games, eat latkes or *sufganiyot*, and sing songs. For those of us who live alone, it might be a time to listen to some music, reflect on the day, sip a glass of wine or a cup of tea, or call a friend or family member.

I have many fond Hanukkah memories over the years, but one stands out. My two children (now grown, with children of their own) loved the holiday. They even invented their own Hanukkah game: Pelt the Gelt! This game is best played on a long rectangular table or open floor. In our house, it is played on our coffee table. It requires at least 10 dreidels and 20 or so chocolate gelt in their wrappers. The players form two teams: the spinners and the pelters. The spinners try to get as many dreidels spinning at once as they can. Meanwhile, the pelters forcefully slide the gelt across the table and try to knock over as many dreidels as possible. A furious struggle ensues, with spinners grabbing fallen dreidels and trying to get them spinning again, while the pelters have to retrieve the gelt that are now scattered all over the floor and send them shooting across the table to hit the dreidels. The pelters win when all of the dreidels have been knocked down.

Israel Affairs

On November 7, Daniel Agranov, the Deputy Consul General of Israel to New England, spoke in person and via Zoom to TIP members about current events in Israel. He described the unique Bennett-Lapid coalition currently governing in the Knesset, with members ranging from the left-leaning Meretz party to the conservative Likud, and even including a member of the United Arab List. The coalition recently passed its first major test by passing a two-year budget. Asked about the growing disaffection of young American Jews from Israel, he talked about the human tendency to favor the "underdog," and the need for a better understanding of history.



The Shalom Hartman course, "Israel's Milestones and Their Meanings," led by Rabba Kaya, has now met three times and has five more sessions on December 12 and 19, January 9 and 23, and February 6, from 10:30 am-12:30 pm. All meetings are now on Zoom (use the regular link for services). Forty-five TIP and community people registered for the course, and, while there has been some dropoff in attendance, participants have found the sessions very rewarding.

Discussion has explored how our Jewish identity has been affected by the creation of Israel, whether Israel influences our spiritual growth, and the divide between older and younger Jews in their perception of Israel. Future topics include Judea and Samaria, One State/Two States, and Jerusalem.

Reproductive Rights & the Abortion Debate: What Can Judaism Teach Us?

On Tuesday, November 9, Temple Israel welcomed Rabbi Leonard Sharzer, MD, who led a thought-provoking and wideranging discussion about Jewish



perspectives on abortion, via Zoom. Informed by his experiences as a practicing physician, his rabbinical studies, and perspective as an educator, he advised attendees that, "If you were to ask, 'What is the Jewish position on abortion?' the first answer to that question is that there is no 'Jewish attitude;' there are many Jewish attitudes." He shared a number of texts from Torah and *Mishnah* outlining historical considerations. Rabbi Sharzer also discussed contemporary approaches to the subject, including a focus on the Jewish value of **justice** as a lens for guiding abortion regulations, as well as the new perspectives to be gained by feminist readings of Jewish texts.

Rabbi Sharzer's talk concluded with an overview of how decision-making about abortions is handled in Israel, before he took questions and responded to reflections from attendees. One participant confessed, "I'm hearing what I didn't expect to hear!" All left with some new information and potential frameworks to consider the subject. This Zoom presentation was recorded. Arts Review Team

Temple Israel was treated to an engaging drama, Rite of Passage, by Izzy Salant, on November 21 in the social hall. Over 35 congregants and friends enjoyed the staged reading of a new play by a young Jewish playwright. Pam Battin-Sacks, who played the aunt of the "bar mitzvah boy" stated, "It meant a lot to me to be working on a play in the early stages of development." The audience became engrossed in the interactions between the characters, vacillating between deep sadness, confusion, and hilarity, especially in scenes that included Noah Greenspan, who played Harold. His timing and delivery were perfect, embodying a character living with autism, who has flashes of wit and insight and a wide range of responses to the loss of his mother. The father, played by Robert Murphy, was a complex character trying to communicate with his son about the truth of his mother's death while facing his own grief. Congregant Steve Sacks was strong and convincing as the rabbi who tutors Harold for his bar mitzvah.

Maura Greenbaum, played by Jocelyn Dufour, appears throughout the two acts. She appears to members of the cast as a ghost, helping each character navigate their own journey through a difficult time.



It is hard to believe the play was read, rather than performed. Transitions were seamless and the actors' body language and expressions made the themes come alive. Many in the audience felt they had gone through their own "rite of passage," responding to the recognizable feelings and stages of their own losses. Kudos to director Myriam Cyr and to Punctuate4 Productions for bringing us their provocative new work. number of Afghans leave their

country. New Hampshire will be the new home for some Afghan evacuees. Learning about the harrowing journey faced by many of these individuals and families increases our awareness of the difficult choices that needed to be made in order to leave Afghanistan. Please join us for what promises to be an educational and interesting conversation.

About the speaker: Barrett Ward is from Plano, Texas. He was commissioned as an Armor Officer in the US Army in 2004 after graduating from Texas Christian University. In 2009, he took command of

an interrogation analysis company and served in Baghdad, Iraq for a year, where he was awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious service in a combat zone. In 2012 he began his PhD Studies in



English Literature at the University of Texas at Austin. He went on to teach at West Point and The United States Air Force Academy. He is presently teaching at The Pingry School, a private day school in New Jersey.

In late August of 2021, Dr. Ward contacted one of his former students from West Point, Shabir Kabiri, who was in Afghanistan. As Kabul was being overtaken by the Taliban, Shabir indicated that he needed immediate assistance. Dr. Ward, along with a small cohort of Shabir's West Point 2015 classmates, joined together to find a way to get Shabir, his family, and another West Point graduate, Naguib (and his family) out of Kabul. Dr. Ward will discuss the attempts made to provide Shabir, Naguib, and their families an escape route from the chaos in Kabul.

The most valuable way to help a refugee family in your community is to be a friend. Your welcome and friendship can go a long way in helping them feel at home. Invite some refugees to a class or to a community meeting to share their experiences. Listen to what they went through before coming to New Hampshire. Find out what their lives were like before they became refugees and what they dream of today. Contact the refugee resettlement agency in your area if you would like to make a donation or help in the resettlement efforts of a refugee family. Know who the refugees are in your community.
