From the Rabbi's Desk

Return to Source

What a pleasure it is to live on the Seacoast with sparkling water at nearly every turn. As a swimmer, I delight in the feel of the water, its buoyancy and softness. This summer I have had the pleasure of bobbing in the waves and taking long swims in the lakes of the Berkshires. And now, as we have entered the month of Elul, I find that water remains for me, the key image of this season as well.

Water is the source of life on this earth. It is the first form described in the Torah. *In the beginning, when God began to create the Heavens and the Earth—the earth being unformed and void, with darkness over the surface of the deep, and a wind from God sweeping over the water...* (Gen. 1:1-2) Water is the first stage in the creation of the earth. It is fluid, changeable, and it softens that which it contacts, so that a trickle of water over rock can create a wonder like the Grand Canyon over time.

As we move through the month of Elul, preceding the shift to a new year, the rabbis encourage us to use this time for *heshbon hanefesh*- to take stock of our selves, our behaviors, attitudes, and reactions. This month offers us the oppor-

tunity to gaze upon our own reflections. Have I reacted with anger when I could have responded with compassion? What is the condition of my relationships? Is there a particular relationship that needs repair? How have I supported my community? Have I contributed enough to the work for justice in our world? This type of selfassessment requires honesty and self-compassion. It requires a softening of the ego, whose grip can create a self-serving rigidity.

The following *kavannah*/Intentional Prayer was written by Rabbi Rachael Klein Miller for use before the ritual of immersion in a *mikveh*- a body of living waters. I offer it as a prayer for this season.

Immersion in water softens our form

Making us malleable,

Dissolving some of the rigidity of who we are.

This allows us to decide who we wish to be

when we come out of the water.

The water changes us neither by washing away something

Nor by letting something soak into us, But simply by softening us So that we can choose To remold ourselves into a different image. (From Ritualwell at ritualwell.org)

Let us use this month of Elul to return to our own source, to catch a glimpse of the essence of who we truly are. As water softens rock, let us begin the process of softening our hearts so that when we come together on Rosh Hashanah, we can truly begin a new year.

President's Message



Dear Fellow Congregants, During the month of Elul, which leads up to Rosh Hashanah, we have several rituals to prepare us for the High Holidays. Some of you are undoubtably familiar with all of them, while others may be aware of only some of them. These

customs include:

- Blowing the shofar each morning (except on Shabbat) to awaken the soul and kick start the month-long spiritual accounting.
- Saying special penitential prayers at morning services.
- Visiting the graves of loved ones to remind us of those on whose shoulders we now stand and to prompt us to think about our own lives and the legacies we will leave for others.
- Reading Psalm 27 each day.
- Studying and taking time for personal reflection around our actions of the past year and seeking forgiveness from those we may have wronged.

This year I would like to focus your attention on the first and last of these customs. Today we frequently consider the sound of the shofar to be aweinspiring, but in ancient times the shofar was used to sound the alarm in cases of danger. As we transition out of our pandemic condition of the past almost three years, I hope that when you hear the shofar it inspires you, but I also hope that it serves as a little bit of an alarm. During the pandemic, many of us have forsaken our previous habit of volunteering for our congregation. As temple programming resumes, we are in dire need of helpers to expand our offerings and to ensure that those who are already volunteering avoid burnout. Without our volunteers organizing service participants, teaching classes, or leading activities, much of our programming would cease to exist. This is why it is so important that each member becomes involved.

As we move forward together into the new year, I encourage each of you to examine how you can expand your support of our temple community by volunteering. Many people had a chance to chat with committee members at the Back to Shul Fest. If you're still unsure where we could use your experience or which committee would be the best match for your interests, please contact me or the office and we will put you in contact with the correct person. If each member gives a little bit of time by participating on one or more committees, we'll be able to dramatically improve Temple Israel for the benefit of all.

Finally, in reflecting on the past year, I recognize that the year has been difficult for many of us. Ideally, we would each have opportunities to speak with each other directly so that we could apologize and ask forgiveness for things we have done that might have caused distress or offense. If you have an issue with me, I invite you to write or call me so that we may talk. And I realize that given the many demands on our time, we may not be able to connect. So, pre-emptively, I ask your forgiveness and offer mine to for any slights or other offense I may have caused or experienced. I hope all our members will be similarly generous to one another.

More Music Is Coming This Year!

Shanah tovah – wishing you a sweet new year! I look forward to seeing our sanctuary and Zoom screen full to overflowing at our upcoming High Holidays services, which promise to be truly uplifting. Cantorial soloist Kochava Munro will again join Rabba Kaya in leading our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur observances.

Thanks to the Temple Israel Music Fund and the Cultural Endowment Fund, music will play a bigger part in Temple Israel's Shabbat and holiday celebrations this year. Surveys have consistently shown that the congregation wants more music during services. Music helps many of us connect more deeply to the prayers and celebrations so central to Jewish life, and to feel more connected to one another. With that information in mind, the Ritual Committee approved a proposal this summer, which was then adopted by the Board of Directors, to hire Lisa Jane Lipkin and Jay Hitt to add music to numerous temple events in the year ahead. We are able to afford this due to grants from our Temple Israel Music Fund, an anonymous private donor, and the Cultural Endowment Fund.

She has served as a cantorial soloist and choir director in numerous synagogues. Jay is an accomplished guitarist and singer/songwriter in his own right. A talented folk musician, Jay has put out several records and performed at folk festivals and concerts nationally. Lisa and Jay live in Hancock, NH.

This year you will hear Lisa and Jay at many of our holiday celebrations, and Lisa will add her voice on the bimah during a number of Saturday morning services in our sanctuary. Torah Inspired Yoga

This year the Temple will once again offer Shabbat yoga on select Saturdays (see Calendar) from 9-10am in the Social Hall. I want to explore the questions you may be asking yourself: Why would I practice yoga on Shabbat? What is the connection between yoga and Shabbat?

One of the best ways to think about it is to consider this quote from Rabba Kaya's June 17, 2022 **Water from the Well** column. She wrote,

"...we are called upon, every day, to create the internal conditions that will enable an experience of connection with the Divine Mystery."

That is a beautiful and precise way to describe yoga: It helps us create those internal conditions. And in doing so, it both prepares us for prayer, and is prayer itself; it is both an activity in harmony with Shabbat, and an expression of it.

One way yoga helps us create those internal conditions is simply by calming our nervous system, and teaching us how to do so consciously. When our nervous system is calmer, i.e., not in an activated "fight or flight" state, we are calmer, and we begin to see more clearly, with greater kindness, and compassion. It helps us quiet and focus our minds. And as our minds quiet, we begin to notice and ask, what's here in this quiet stillness? Who am I when I'm not worrying, distracted, or pressured? What's most important now? What am I grateful for? You might notice that these are the kinds of questions one asks in temple, and that they are comfortably, if not spontaneously, asked in the inner space created when we practice yoga. As Rabba Kaya wrote, we have "... the capacity to build an internal sanctuary, a makom, a place for the Divine Presence to dwell...to create a centered, balanced, and loving inner state, so that the Divine Presence may be expressed through us. But it takes a commitment to some regular spiritual practice, one that helps us to open our awareness to the blessings in our lives and the profound ways in which all is connected. This is the gift of Shabbat, connecting and expanding our awareness, for building an inner Mishkan." Please join me in developing your own regular spiritual practice, and inner sanctuary, by trying Shabbat yoga.

SISC Update

By Jewel Davis, Tikkun Olam Committee Member Temple Israel Portsmouth is one of the faith community Members of SISC (Seacoast Interfaith Sanctuary Coalition). We ensure that sanctuary is available in the seacoast of NH for immigrant families facing the threats of detention, deportation, family separation and violence. We are especially helpful to those whom ICE has placed in detention in the Dover, NH prison facility. Right now, congregant Carolina Barba has been incredibly generous to offer housing and many other kinds of support including fellowship to a young man named Mastan from Africa who feared for his life in his home country. He is now taking a course at Great Bay Community College and needs rides from Hampton to Great Bay Community College in Newington and back home again. His class meets from 12:00 pm to 3:00 pm at Great Bay on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

We are also looking for more volunteers to join SISC. We meet once a month on Zoom led by Maggie Fogerty, usually the third Sunday of the month but this month we're meeting on September 11 at 4:00 pm.
