in an age of overstimulation and multi-tasking, in which the demands upon our attention can feel dizzying. More than ever, we all need the beautiful sacred pause that is the gift of Shabbat.

Shabbat is referred to as both

a celebration of Creation and a remembrance of the exodus from Egypt. It is a time for both the celebration of the blessings in our world and an exercise in freedom from what enslaves us; a time to turn off our devices, to center and ground ourselves in the present moment and experience, with gratitude, the blessings that surround us.

I am delighted to share with you the many ways we can enter into Shabbat in our community this new year. Each week of every month we will offer a different Shabbat experience. The First Friday of each month will include a Tot Shabbat service at 4:30pm followed by an Alternative Kabbalat Shabbat service with special musical guests. On the second Friday of each month, we will share a traditional Kabbalat Shabbat service without instruments. On the third Shabbat of each month, we will have a slightly shorter service followed by a communal Shabbat meal, a dairy/vegetarian potluck supper, with table blessings and Shabbat songs. The full series of services is listed on our website calendar. I look forward to celebrating our most treasured gift of sacred time with you this year.

And this month, we will have a most special Shabbat treat that is not to be missed! Composer, multi-instrumentalist and internationally recognized Jewish musician Elana Arian joins us as Artist-in-Residence the Shabbat of November 18 - 19. She will co-lead both of our Shabbat services, teach new music to our Hebrew School students, and give a concert on Saturday night. Much more than a concert, this special evening will be a chance to join our voices together in communal song and harmony that you won't want to miss. Dessert in the social hall will follow the musical program. More details can be found on page 13 of this issue. I hope to see you very soon.

Dear fellow congregants,
In my Rosh Hashanah
speech, I shared good news
about the progress we
have made in the past year.
To name just a few recent
initiatives, the House
Committee has been
energetically addressing
safety improvements in the

sanctuary attic and fire

suppression system. The Development and Financial Oversight committees are diligent in tending to the financial health of our temple. The Cemetery Committee has made a number of landscape repairs and improvements.

And, as we continue to navigate the ups and downs of the pandemic, we have welcomed the return of large social events. The Ritual Committee and Rabba Kaya organized April's Community Passover Seder, several summer outdoor services at Strawbery Banke, the Break the Fast meal after Yom Kippur services, and a spirited Simchat Torah celebration, all of which were well-attended. B'nei mitzvah celebrations have concluded with community kiddushes sponsored by our students' families. Head of School/Family Programming Coordinator Erik Martin has created memorable programs, especially for families and teens, including the Back to Shul Fest, S'mores Havdalah, and the Haunted Shul program. The Arts Review Team has hosted receptions to meet the artists and discuss their work on display. The Tikkun Olam Committee is preparing an evening program to benefit a refugee family resettled in Portsmouth.

Major events like these brighten the life of our community and their success is due to our volunteers. Without our volunteers completing tasks large and small, much of our programming would cease to exist. This is why it is so important that each member become involved. During the pandemic, many of us have forsaken our previous habit of volunteering for our congregation. I encourage you to think about where you could contribute to help to expand our offerings and support our steadfast volunteer crews.

In addition, we now urgently need someone to fill a critical position: Membership Committee Chair. The Membership Committee is vital to the future of our congregation, with primary responsibility for responding to membership inquiries and making new congregants feel welcome. This committee has dedicated members who perform much of the work, but we need someone to coordinate their efforts. Since our committee chairs are appointed rather than elected, the term of Membership Chair is for two years once appointed by the President and approved by our Board of Directors.

As we move forward together into the new year, I encourage each of you to set aside some time to strengthen your temple by volunteering. If you're unsure where we could use your experience or which committee would be the best match for your interests, please contact me or the office to discuss. If each member gives a little bit of their time by participating on one or more of our committees, we'll be able to dramatically improve Temple Israel for the benefit of all.

And for all those volunteers who have made the aforementioned successes possible, you have our sincere thanks and appreciation.

#### **Short and Very Sweet**

If you are saying kaddish for a loved one's yahrzeit, the Tuesday minyan (5:30-6:00 pm, via Zoom) is a great place to do it. The group is there to support you and loves to hear about the person you are remembering, whether it is a parent, a child, a sibling, or a partner. Connecting with our memories is at the essence of the yahrzeit experience. As we light the yahrzeit candle, we reflect back on who this person was and what they meant to us. By sharing those memories with others, we bring a piece of them back. And then by making a charitable donation of tzedakah in their memory, we make real the influence they had on our lives, carrying their values forward to help others.

The minyan is a gem hiding in plain sight if you know where to look. Since the start of Covid, it meets only online, so all you need to participate is an internet connection, a computer, tablet, or phone, and a Zoom link (sent in our "This Week" email each Friday). It helps if you have a *Lev Shalem siddur* to read from, but if not you can use the virtual prayerbook (that link is also in the weekly email).

What makes the minyan so special? First, the service is very brief – only about 15-20 minutes in length.

Second, the prayers are familiar to anyone who has gone to Shabbat services. When the minyan occurs before sunset (spring through fall), we daven (pray) a Mincha (afternoon): Ashrei, Hatzi Kaddish, Amidah, a Mi Sheberakh for those who are not well, Kaddish Shalem, Aleinu, and Mourner's Kaddish. If it is already dark (in the later fall, winter, and early

spring), we recite the prayers for Maariv (evening): Barkhu, Sh'ma and V'ahavta, Mi Khamokha, Hatzi Kaddish, silent Amidah, Mi Sheberakh, Kaddish Shalem, Aleinu, and Mourner's Kaddish. Third, the people are warm and welcoming. If you stick around

for a few minutes after the service, you can get to know the other participants. Some of the regular attendees are located in the Seacoast area, some regulars live in Portland or Downeast (Maine), and some join in from their travels, whether in Florida, Colorado, or more exotic locations. But wherever the participants are, they form a brief, supportive community that is welcoming to all.

Temple Israel has had a Tuesday afternoon minyan for about the last ten years. I believe it came about when someone who was here for several months on a sabbatical wanted to say kaddish daily for a loved one and asked if we had a weekday minyan. After looking at our schedule, we realized that between Friday night services (which at some times of the year occur before sunset), Saturday morning, and religious school days (at that time Sundays and Wednesdays), when we had a student minyan, the only days not covered were Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday. We decided to add the Tuesday minyan to partially meet this visitor's need, and we've had it ever since. At first it was led by congregants, since Tuesdays used to be the rabbi's day off. These days the service is led either by Rabba Kaya or by a lay leader.

I encourage you to give the Tuesday minyan a try, especially if you are reciting kaddish – but be warned: It can be habit-forming.

### Treasurer's Message

Dear fellow congregants,

As we enter the second quarter of our new fiscal year, which began on July 1, I would like to offer an update to our congregation on the finances of Temple Israel.

The overall financial health of our Temple is good. We are fortunate to own our historic synagogue at 200 State Street, the adjoining property at 170 State Street, and our cemetery on Banfield Road, all with no mortgages. The Temple has historically been self-financed through dues, school tuition, rental income, and the generous donations of our Temple community. We have no existing loans.

Through a collaborative process, we create an operating budget that supports our Hebrew School, Pre-School, staff, building expenses, and many of our programs, events, and Jewish ritual observations and services. Each budget is presented to the membership at our annual meeting.

Each year we are fortunate to receive many donations from our congregation. In addition to our annual appeal, we have more than twenty other "restricted" funds, which are segregated and only utilized for their intended purpose. Restricted funds include our Library, Kiddush, Tzedakah, Tikkun Olam, Security, Music, Sisterhood, Brotherhood, and the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund, among others.

The Temple also has a long-established group of endowment funds. With endowment contributions, the funds are preserved for perpetuity, and only the income generated from investing the principal is used. A large portion of our endowment funds is invested in Israeli Bonds. The income is used to support cultural events, education, and a portion of our operating expenses.

Traditionally, our dues, school tuition, and rental income from 170 State Street have supported our operating budget. This formula has not worked since the beginning of the pandemic in 2020. The primary reason

has been the loss of our tenant at 170 State Street and reduced Hebrew School enrollment. This has resulted in a dependence on donations, such as our annual appeal, to balance the operating budget. Our goal is to reduce the reliance on donations to balance the operating budget by investigating new rental opportunities for 170 State and continuing the work of growing our congregation and our Hebrew School.

We continue to pursue and receive grants that supplement our income. Tammy Roberge, Director of our Early Learning Center, has been very successful in securing ELC Grants. In addition, we have recently received a Homeland Security grant from the New Hampshire Department of Safety.

The costs of maintaining our historic synagogue can be significant. This year, we have spent over \$50,000 to update the fire suppression system in the sanctuary building. Our house committee is continuing to research the need to replace our roof and HVAC systems, which are nearing the end of their useful life. We know this will be a very significant expense for which we will consider a variety of financing and hopefully grant options.



### Chevra Kadisha

Literally "a sacred society," the chevra kadisha is a group of volunteers who lovingly prepare the bodies of Jewish deceased for burial. The contemporary chevra kadisha often works hand-in-hand with



funeral parlors and cemeteries to provide a proper Jewish burial.

Assisting and escorting the deceased on their final earthly journey is considered a great mitzvah. Indeed, it is taught that since Moses cared for the remains of Joseph, he merited that God oversaw his own burial. This mitzvah of caring for the body of the deceased is referred to as *chesed shel emet* which means an ultimate act of kindness, since the deceased are not able to repay their benefactors. In some communities, the members of the *chevra kadisha* remain anonymous.

The ritual of preparation is called *taharah*, "cleansing." It includes a gentle and respectful cleaning of the body, followed by a spiritual purification using water. The body is then carefully dressed in burial garments that represent the attire of the High Priest in the days of the Temple, who on

Yom Kippur would enter the Holy of Holies to atone for the people. All are dressed alike to go before God. In the spirit of modesty, women perform the *taharah* on women, and men do the same for men. This entire ritual is filled with beauty, gentleness, and respect, and is accompanied by a powerful liturgy taken from selected portions of the *Tanakh* (Hebrew Bible).


