From the Rabbi's Desk

Spring is finally here! The days are longer, and the light is clear and bright as we approach our Festival of Freedom - Passover.

This is a time for cleaning out the dusty cobwebs and crumbs that have accumulated in our homes and metaphorically, within ourselves as well. Passover is a jumpstart for the stirrings of the soul. In the Mishna (*Pesachim* 10:5) it is taught that in every generation, every one of us is obligated to see ourselves as though we too went out of Egypt. That is, the Passover journey from enslavement to freedom is an eternal, inner experience that we are required to summon.

As spring seeds burst and blossoms bloom, we are asked at every seder gathering to embody this movement from degradation to celebration, from constriction to expansion.

The word for Egypt in Hebrew is *mitzrayim*. The root of this word is *meitzar* which means a narrow, constricted place. We have all experienced a great narrowing of our lives during these last three years. We have all encountered many expressions of *mitzrayim*, in both our inner and outer lives, as possibilities for all kinds of encounters were limited, narrowed, and restricted.

In the Passover story we discover an interesting phenomenon. From the onset of the Exodus and throughout the liberation process, there are always people who, motivated by fear, do not want to continue the liberation journey, but rather wish to return to the familiar enslavement of their past. This is a repetitive theme throughout the Torah, which I would suggest is because it is part of human nature.

When the pandemic began, many of us were ill at ease with the narrowing of our social lives, the shift to Zoom gatherings, and the lack of physical human interaction. However, over time we became accustomed to the "new normal" and for some, the expansive shift back to in-person gatherings has been a challenge.

More broadly speaking, we have all constructed our lives in ways that respond to an inner pharaoh, an

inner voice, that keeps us enslaved to certain tasks or that holds us back from fulfilling our dreams.

This Passover, as we emerge from darkness to light, from constriction to expansion, let us each consider one thing from which we wish to break free. This is the Passover gift from our tradition to every generation. Let us take one step forward on our freedom journey.

President's Message



Dear Fellow Congregants, This year as we prepare once again for Pesach, we are reminded that there are still people in this world who would like to oppress us as the Egyptians did millennia ago. Fortunately, this time we have friends and neighbors who are willing and able to support us.

Following the hate incident I wrote about last month, we saw a flood of support from Portsmouth and the greater Seacoast community. We continue to receive messages of backing and donations from both members and non-members. We also had a torrent of support at the "Community Gathering for Love" held at our temple on the Sunday after that incident. Rabba Kaya organized and led the event, which was attended by more than 200 people. We must continue our *tikkun olam* efforts of repairing the world.

Another news item that I have heard a lot about in recent days is the announcement by Seacoast Chabad that they are purchasing land in Newington and plan to locate their "new Seacoast Jewish Community Center" there. We should view the efforts of Chabad as complementary to ours in building a stronger Jewish community in the Seacoast area rather than as competition. Temple Israel has served as the center of the Seacoast Jewish community for over 100 years and we plan to continue doing so for the foreseeable future.

Our planning for the future of our temple was significantly enhanced by all our members who

participated in the listening sessions that NH Listens led for us. I extend my heartfelt thanks to each of you who participated, for making the time in your busy schedules to engage in this important endeavor.

We have now received the draft report from NH Listens, which our Board of Directors will be reviewing and attempting to incorporate into our plans for the future of our congregation. To me, a key finding is that there is ". . . considerable agreement among those who participated in the two conversations regarding Temple Israel's purpose, its value to its members (and the larger community), and the programming it offers to children as well as adults." I view this as good news in that it should enable us to move forward with unity of purpose.

The final item I want to mention this month is that after more than a year of planning, we are one step closer to having our Reserve Study completed. The engineer doing the study spent two days in our temple in March reviewing the temple building and all its mechanical, plumbing, and electrical systems. The result of this study will enable us to do better financial planning for when our current systems need replacement, which they certainly will. In fact, the engineer commented that the flat roof over the school wing and the air conditioning and ventilation system components have already exceeded their expected useful lifetimes and should be replaced as soon as financially feasible.

I wish all of you and your families a joyful Pesach - *Chag Sameach*.

Passover Transitions

In the Jewish calendar, spring brings Passover in all its manifestations. In preparation for Passover, many of us clean our cupboards to get rid of the chametz (crumbs) and drips that have accumulated over the past year. When I dig into the back of my cabinets I am reminded of the good intentions that went nowhere (whole wheat flour), holidays celebrated with family and friends (canned pumpkin from Thanksgiving, applesauce to go with latkes at Hanukkah), and visitors who came and went (rice milk for my dairy-free daughter, herbal tea left by a friend). I enjoy this cleaning-out process because it makes room for new foods and new experiences. New plans have room to develop once the cabinets are emptied. As the matzah and gefilte fish arrive, I look forward to special Passover dishes from my childhood and from recent years, like matzah brei, chicken with bitter herbs, and Passover nut cake.

On the Ritual Committee we have also been planning for new arrivals in recent months. A small subcommittee formed in January to find our next High Holidays cantor to take the place of Kochava Munro, who is moving on in her professional life after serving as our cantor for the past four years. More than 30 candidates applied for the position, and we are delighted to share that Eliana Willis, a rabbinic student completing her studies at Hebrew College, will be on our bimah beside Rabba Kaya next fall to guide us through the High Holidays. Eliana has a warm presence and a beautiful voice. She and her husband live in the Boston area. She is very much looking forward to getting to know our community. We are also making plans to add a rabbinic intern to our professional staff next fall. Hebrew College (located near Boston) runs an internship program in which it matches congregations with students. We have applied to participate in this program. The intern will be with us for about 10 hours

per week during the school year, working under Rabba Kaya's supervision. The intern will help to lead services, teach our students, assist with programs for teens, participate in life cycle events, and more. We won't know who our intern will be until May, so look for news about that in an upcoming *Doorpost*.

This Passover, I hope you experience some of the joy of moving from narrowness to freedom, remembering our people's story of the escape from Egypt, and celebrating it with friends and family. All are welcome at our community seder on the second night of Pesach, April 6. May your Pesach be meaningful and joyous. I hope that it leads you into new territory of exploration, connection, and growth.

Endowment Funds

By Ira Schwartz, Chair, Endowment Fund Committee In coordination with the annual **Passover Endowment Fund Appeal,** it seems appropriate to review some of the principles of the endowment fund program, and to be aware of

updates and developments that are new this year.

The entire purpose of our endowment funds remains constant: Endowment funds supply financial support to our temple, making it easier to operate our facility and to support programs and activities that keep us engaged and involved.

What is new this year?

The Endowment Fund Committee and the Board of Directors have arranged for professional oversight of \$1.4 million of endowment fund principal by members of the Trust and Investment Department of Piscataqua Bank. This is expected to result in increased returns on our investments. We will continue to maintain a substantial investment in Israel Bonds.

What else is new this year?

For a second year in a row, a founding contribution of \$25,000 has created a new endowment fund: the "Tikkun Olam Endowment: Sanford Roberts Fund for Social Justice." You will learn more about this endowment next month.

What is old this year?

The interest generated by the Institutional Operating, Dinnerman-Rottenberg, and Legacy Endowment funds has supported continued operations at our temple. "As my fathers planted for me before I was born, so do I plant for those who will come after me."

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Israel Affairs

The Israel Affairs Committee is sponsoring a number of excellent spring events. On March 11, NH Shaliach Ra'anan de Haas spoke at a Lunch and Learn to forty participants about recent events in Israel. He described the alliances necessary to reach a 61-seat majority in the Knesset, and PM Netanyahu's creation of the most right-leaning coalition ever to form an Israeli administration. With the PM at the head of the coalition and only one legislative body, the only check and balance on Knesset legislation is the court system. Israel has no constitution but a set of basic laws which can change at the will of the Knesset. As Ra'anan pointed out, even some on the right oppose judicial reforms because they give unfettered power to the ruling coalition, left or right.

On Sunday, April 16, at 11:00 am, IAC is holding a



bagel brunch featuring Dr. Fredrik Meiton of UNH. Professor Meiton is a historian of the modern Middle East. His topic is **"The 22 State Solution: A History of the Arab-Israeli Conflict up to the Abraham Accords."** This event is inperson only.

Prof Meiton's talk will kick off what one source calls the season of "the three Yoms:" Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), April 18, Yom HaZikaron (Israel Memorial Day) April 25, and Yom Ha'atzmaut (Israel Independence Day) April 26. Yom Hashoah and Yom HaZikaron are solemn days memorializing those lost in the Holocaust and in the War for Independence, followed by the celebration for independence itself.

Yom Hashoah Tuesday, April 18, 7:00 pm

Dr. Louis Levine will speak at Temple Israel's

Yom Hashoah service. Topic: LIBERATORS, American Servicemen Confront the Holocaust.

Dr. Levine's talk draws on an awardwinning exhibit he produced at the



Museum of Jewish Heritage in NYC. In person and via Zoom. **A Holocaust memorabilia exhibit** from the private collection of Ira Schwartz will be displayed in the social hall from 4/15 - 4/18.



Nafkot (Yearning), a film about a village of Jews still living in Ethiopia, will be screened on April 19, 3:30 - 5:30 pm, at the MUB Theater, UNH. This year marks Israel's 75th anniver-

sary and the Jewish Federation of NH is planning a multi-synagogue celebration in Bow on Sunday, May 21, from 2:00 - 4:00 pm, called **"Walk the Land."** Each synagogue is creating a booth to represent a city in Israel. TIP will present Tzfat (Safed), the high home of Jewish mysticism in northern Israel. If you are not participating in TIP Reads, which culminates in a gathering on the afternoon of May 21, we could use your help.

New Immigrant / Asylum Seeker Shabbat

A special Kabbalat Shabbat service sponsored by the Tikkun Olam Committee will take place on **Friday, April 28, 2023 from 6:30 - 7:30 pm.** Guest speakers who work closely with new immigrants in Portsmouth will join Rabba Kaya and musicians Lisa Jane Lipkin and Jay Hitt for this special service.

Maggie Fogarty, NH Leader of the Seacoast Interfaith Sanctuary Coalition (SISC), will talk about immigrants who have resettled locally.

Sudie Blanchard and Charlotte Ramsey, Team Seacoast leaders, will share the rewarding experience of resettling the Khyber family. They moved to Portsmouth after escaping from the Taliban in Afghanistan.





Adding to the ongoing crisis for those fleeing danger in their home countries, people seeking asylum are turned away at borders around the world.
