President's Message



Robert Zimman President

Dear Fellow Congregants,

When I started my term as board president in May 2021, I identified two major areas as critical to continued success and future health: increased member participation and financial stability. I feel we have made progress on both fronts. As your board reflects

on the insights gained from our "Together on Purpose" sessions to

guide next steps, I encourage ALL members to continue participating and sharing your thoughts and ideas. **Don't miss the Annual Meeting and Hot Dog Supper at 5:30 pm on Monday, May 8.** Please join me in recognizing the dedicated service of outgoing board members Rachel Kurshan, Loren Selig, and Julie Serrano, and the ongoing contributions of your TIP leadership.

In my final *Doorpost* president's message, I would like to review some highlights from the last two years.

RITUAL — Rabba Kaya, since her arrival in July of 2020, has overcome many pandemic-related obstacles and has helped move our congregation forward. We are pleased that her contract has been renewed through June 2027.

Recently, we have engaged Jacob Chatinover, a fourthyear student at Hebrew College, to join us as a rabbinic intern for the 2023-2024 academic year. He will be involved in several areas including worship and education.

EDUCATION — Changing congregational demographics and the pandemic resulted in a significant reduction in the size of our religious school. When we returned to inperson learning, we shifted our Sunday classes to Shabbat, enabling students and their parents to experience Shabbat. Last fall, we hired Erik Martin as our Head of School / Family Programming Coordinator. He and our Education Committee have worked to revise our curriculum, mapping out goals and measurable learning objectives for each grade.

HOUSE — After nearly two years of planning, our Reserve Study is complete. This will enable us to improve financial planning for the replacement of mechanical and other systems, especially with respect to the maintenance of our historic building.

Earlier this year, when the sanctuary sprinkler system failed inspection, we learned that during installation (over fifteen years ago), some of the pipes were installed with improper pitch. To correct this problem, we installed additional catwalks and lighting in the attic. With the new catwalks, lighting, and repaired sprinkler system we should be in good shape for years to come.

FINANCIAL — As Ira Schwartz wrote in the April issue of the *Doorpost*, endowment funds were established so that their annual income would support temple operating expenses and programs in perpetuity. Since the beginning, a team of member volunteers has managed these investments. Now the Endowment Committee, supported by the board, has decided to place a large portion of the funds under professional management with the hope of improving returns. After interviewing several financial institutions, we chose the Trust Department at Piscataqua Savings Bank.

A committee led by Treasurer Rich LeSavoy has been reviewing alternative dues models to recommend how we might better define the financial support required from each of our congregants. This work will continue during the coming year.

The item with the biggest immediate positive financial impact is the signing of a lease for our property at 170 State Street (vacant for over two years) with the Proprietors of the Portsmouth Athenaeum. We believe this lease will be beneficial to both parties and look forward to a long relationship.

As I conclude my term, I leave with the hope that in some small way I have helped to position our congregation for a bright and long-lasting future. L'dor v'dor - From generation to generation.

Shavuot: A Holiday of Blossoms, Blintzes, Torah, and Study

As a child I learned the rhyme "April showers bring May flowers," which comes to mind at this time of year. In Judaism, May flowers and fresh budding trees are celebrated at Shavuot, when we decorate our homes and synagogue with greenery and blossoms.

Shavuot is a holiday with multiple identities. It is known as Hag ha-Shavuot (the Feast of Weeks), Yom ha-Bikkurim (Day of the First Fruits), and Hag ha-katzir (Harvest Feast). Primarily it is celebrated as the day on which the Jewish people received the Torah at Mount Sinai. It concludes our counting of the Omer, which began seven weeks earlier on the second day of Passover. It marks the day when the barley should be ready for harvest and, in the days of the Temple, would be brought to the Temple as a special offering. Today we have substituted offerings of prayer for physical offerings of grain, so we hold special services on Shavuot morning at which we read from the Torah and offer songs of praise (Hallel). We also recognize and honor Jews by choice by chanting from the Book of Ruth.

It is traditional to eat blintzes and other dairy foods on Shavuot. Why blintzes? The idea is that they look like Torah scrolls, and this holiday celebrates our receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai.

At Temple Israel we will begin our Shavuot celebration with a dairy potluck dinner – a blintz buffet – at 6:30 pm on Thursday, May 25 (erev Shavuot), followed by a Tikkun Leil Shavuot, a night of learning, with several study sessions led by different members of the community.

Come for one or all of these activities! You are invited to share a favorite blintz creation or other dairy dish. While we will not study all night as is traditional at some temples, the sessions will extend until about 10:30 pm. Coffee will be provided!

On Friday, May 26, we will hold a traditional Shavuot morning service at 10:00 am, including reading the Torah passages that recount the giving of the Torah at Sinai and the Decalogue, the recitation of the Ten Commandments. Please join us for this special reading. We will also join voices in songs of praise (Hallel) and read from the Book of Ruth (Megillat Ruth), which recounts the story of Ruth, the first Jew by choice, and her decision to follow Naomi, her mother-in-law, rather than return to her non-Israelite family of origin after the death of her husband. Because we follow the Israeli custom of only observing Shavuot for one day, we will include Yizkor in our Friday morning service.

Finally, thank you to all who helped make our community Passover seder such a success! Many hands were involved, and each was critical to making the evening go smoothly.

We are always looking for more volunteers to help with our community-wide events. If you can assist with decorating, cooking, greeting, or otherwise helping at a future event, please notify the temple office and Heather will add you to our event volunteer corps.

Many of us are following the news out of Israel with great interest. On April 16, 40 people enjoyed a delicious bagel brunch at TIP and listened to UNH professor Fredrik Merton review the history of the Arab-Israeli conflict leading up to the Abraham Accords, what he called "The 22-State Solution." But, as we all know, the Palestinian-Israeli conflict is ongoing, and the court reform proposals are yet to be resolved.


Knowing that these topics can be controversial and hard to talk about, the committee is planning to offer a program from Israel, "Stories For the Sake of Argument" in the fall. The program will include a book and a 90minute workshop led via Zoom from Israel. The authors of the book are Israeli educators who believe we need to have more arguments, not fewer, but need the tools to talk with people with whom we disagree. In their book, they present stories indirectly or directly involving Israel to get us to engage with those with whom we disagree. They state, "Israel's local arguments are the arguments of this world. Only louder. Arguments over race. Arguments between personal conscience and public decree. Arguments about power and force. About East and West. About land and resources. About democratic rights."

The committee will participate in the Federation "Walk the Land" event in honor of the 75th anniversary of Yom Ha'Atzmaut, Israel's Independence Day. Happening at the Bow Community Center from 2-4 pm on Sunday, May 21, six NH synagogues will each offer a table representing an Israeli city, with activities for children and adults. TIP will represent the city of Safed (Tz'fat) with spin art, mandala coloring, a history timeline and quiz, and a touch of Kabbalah. 


