Israel on my mind...

Last week I had the good fortune to attend the discussion between Rabbi Marc Baker, the CEO of Combined Jewish Philanthropies-Boston, and Daniel Gordis, a noted

American-born Israeli scholar and author who holds both a doctoral degree and rabbinic ordination. I'd like to share with you some of the salient points offered by Daniel Gordis about the current situation in Israel.

Dr. Gordis began by stating his opinion that Israel is facing the most profound crisis in her 75-year existence. He noted that a poll taken just after the Knesset vote to limit the power of the Supreme Court revealed that 28% of Israelis are now considering leaving the country. Additionally, at least 3000 medical doctors have protested this new law, with thousands inquiring about jobs overseas. If thousands of Israel's doctors emigrate, it would precipitate a health care crisis. In addition, 70% of Israel's tech companies are considering leaving the country. Israeli air-force reserve pilots have threatened not to serve if called, leaving the country in a position in which they are not "battleready." Whether or not one agrees with the new law curtailing the power of the Supreme Court, it is clear that a vast swath of Israelis from all backgrounds see this move as existentially threatening.

To better understand this move by Netanyahu's coalition, to alter Israel's judicial system, Gordis strongly urged everyone to read the legislation. It is not as simple as presented in news articles and sound bites. One can read a legal review of the legislation https://

The recent vote is a first step in a project of additional judicial reforms that Gordis explains will strengthen the power of the ultra-religious rightwing parties, weaken the rights of women, LGBTQ individuals, and the non-orthodox population, and

give exclusive power to the Orthodox rabbinate over conversion, marriage, divorce, and other activities.



Finally, Gordis reminded

us of our history regarding Jewish sovereignty in the land of Israel. The First Commonwealth, ruled by a unified kingdom lasted for 73 years before it divided due to internal conflict and eventually was destroyed on Tisha B'Av in 586 BCE. The second Commonwealth lasted 74 years before it was conquered and destroyed on Tisha B'Av in 70 CE. Today our State of Israel is 75 years old. Will it survive this current crisis?

Watching from afar, my heart is breaking as the dream of Israel is ripping at its seams. Our Israeli friends are asking us all to lean in closer to Israel at this critical time. This means paying attention to what is happening there, educating ourselves and supporting efforts to preserve the pluralistic and democratic values upon which the state was founded. There is too much at stake for us to remain bystanders.

Please consider learning from and supporting some of these Israeli organizations working to preserve a pluralistic and democratic Israel: Shalom Hartman Institute, Israel Religious Action Center, Center for Women's Justice, Women of the Wall, Fuchsberg Jerusalem Center.





Fun facts: Three "must-see" movies this summer have a Jewish connection. The inventor of the original *Barbie* doll toy was Ruth Handler, cofounder of the Mattel Toy Company. Her vision and chutzpah impacted generations of young girls. J. Robert *Oppenheimer* was the brilliant Jewish physicist and director of the Manhattan Project, working on the atomic bomb. Israel Affairs

How does one write a column about Israel affairs in the midst of the turmoil currently engulfing the country? Watching the upheaval is heartwrenching. Trying to understand the legal minutia is challenging. Is this a conflict between Ashkenazi and Mizrahi? Between secular and religious? Between democracy and theocracy? Is it about shifting the power of checks and balances between judiciary and Knesset (which combines legislative and executive branches in Israel)? Is the goal to rein in an overly aggressive court, or to give more leeway to the annexationists, or to rescue Netanyahu from legal accountability?

Our role in the Jewish diaspora is to care and to be informed. Week after week, thousands of Israelis take to the streets to voice their concerns. The least we can do is learn what they are fighting for. There are many resources online explaining how Israeli judges are chosen, the importance of the "reasonableness" standard, or the history and role of "Basic Laws." What will be the future of our homeland?

Stories for the Sake of Argument

Coming Sunday, November 5, the IAC will host a workshop on conducting conversations when opinions are polarized, a highly relevant topic for both Israel and the United States. Sadly, many synagogues avoid discussing Israel because the conversations become too contentious. The authors of the book *Stories for the Sake of Argument* are Israeli educators who believe that we need to have more arguments, not fewer, but need the tools to talk with people with whom we disagree.

The 10:00 a.m. in- person workshop will meet with Israeli facilitators via Zoom. Participants will buy the book of stories for \$10, to be used in the workshop and in follow-up discussion groups. Book ordering is included with online



registration via the website calendar. While the workshop is specifically geared to discussions about Israel, attendees will learn tools to help with any discussion with others whose viewpoints differ.



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
