Keeping the Ruach Alive

High Holidays are a highlight of our year at Temple Israel, our sanctuary full with members, friends, visitors, and the **ruach** (spirit) of the holidays. I treasure the feeling of community in our sanctuary as we join together in song and prayer to embrace the new year. Judging by the buzz of voices during the midpoint break before the High Holidays Torah services, I'm not the only one.

This year Rabba Kaya and cantorial soloist Eliana Willis raised us to new levels of spirituality and joy through their prayer leadership and gorgeous melodies. If you enjoyed High Holiday services, please let Rabba Kaya know with a brief note or email. We have sent out a short survey to gather your thoughts and reactions as well.

I want to thank the many volunteers – ushers, greeters, the gift basket team, shofar blowers, Torah and haftarah readers, and gabbaim -- who helped make this year's High Holidays memorable. I deeply appreciate the work of the High Holiday Steering Committee, whose members worked behind the scenes for the past four months. And I want to thank Heather Tomlinson, whose assistance at every turn was essential, as well as Dan and Jeannie Hastie, who made our building shine.

At this time of heightened joy and intensity, I find myself wondering how we can maintain our spirituality and engagement during the rest of the year. While I know the sanctuary will not be

full again for many months, perhaps the answer is to engage in sacred experiences on a smaller scale each week. That is the beauty inherent in Shabbat, the original, and perhaps most important, holy day of the Jewish calendar.

If you too are looking for ways to maintain the ruach of the holidays in the year ahead, consider trying one of these activities:

- Light candles on Friday nights, reciting the candle blessings. The light of the candles creates a special aura that may transform an ordinary evening meal into a sacred time.
- Bake challah and share it with others on Shabbat. Don't know how? I recommend Joan Nathan's video on YouTube demonstrating how it's done. Just search "Joan Nathan challah." Or join our challah baking class coming up later this fall. We may even have a challah bake-off challenge!
- Invite friends over for a Shabbat dinner, potluck or otherwise. As host, be sure to have challah, wine for kiddush, and candles. If you need a sheet with the text for the blessings, we can help.
- Go for a quiet walk in the woods or at the beach on Shabbat, letting go of the stresses of the week and basking in the healing forces of the natural world.
- Join us for a Shabbat service on Friday night or Saturday morning. You will be greeted with smiles. If you come on a Saturday, you will likely be invited to have an aliyah or other honor. Stick around after the service to meet and greet the others who are there, whether standing in the aisles or over a light snack or a meal.

Siyyum | Life Cycle of Sacred Texts

Temple Israel is privileged to have a Torah scroll that was rescued from the Holocaust. This scroll was used by a Jewish community in Czechoslovakia before the Shoah. It, along with 1563 other Czech Torah scrolls, was moved and hidden during the war and years later brought to the U.K. It is on loan to our congregation from the Memorial Scrolls Trust. We are entrusted to be the caretakers of the scroll, as well as to honor the memory of the Jewish communities of Czechoslovakia that were destroyed. As you may imagine, the scroll is fragile and after many years of use, is now in need of repair.

Rabbi Kevin Hale, a סופר sofer, (Torah scribe) has been working on repairs at his studio in Western MA since late August. He will finish the restoration here on site so that our students and community can observe and participate in the sacred act of writing a Torah. Hebrew School children and congregants may have the chance to participate in this mitzvah by helping the sofer to fill in a letter in the Torah that he has already outlined. Be sure not to miss this special occasion!

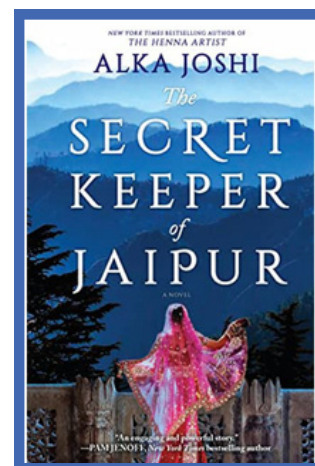

Genizah Teaching

Wednesday, October 18, 4:00 pm

Hebrew School students will visit the Temple Israel cemetery on Banfield Rd. to participate in an unusual burial. In Jewish tradition we do not simply discard sacred texts (ones which include God's name) that have become worn out, damaged, or otherwise unusable. Instead, we show our respect for their significance by burying them in the cemetery. The place where these sacred texts are stored until they can be buried is called a genizah, from the Hebrew root g-n-z meaning "hidden." In some cases, texts are never buried, but are stored forever in a space set aside as a genizah. You may have heard of the famous Cairo Genizah, a treasure trove of ancient
