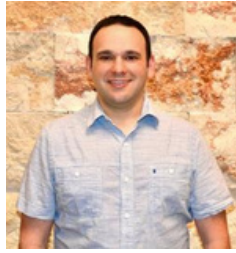

President's Message

Dear TIP Community,

As we begin the new secular year, I wanted to take this opportunity to talk to you about security.

Since the October 7th attack on Israel, we have all seen the news about increased antisemitism, at home and abroad. The increase of antisemitic acts, threats, and rhetoric has had a profound effect on how and whether people may choose to outwardly display their Judaism. Some conceal their jewelry, fearful of what the reactions the Magen David might elicit; others proudly display a hanukkiah in their window. While these are individual decisions, we can act jointly to affirm the strength of our community and increase our mutual safety.

Our congregation is fortunate to own a beautiful historic building in a downtown location. Our urban setting, as well as the age and design of our building, affect our security concerns. As individuals and as a community, it is imperative that we maintain good situational awareness. That means knowing our environment, the elements that comprise it, and how these factors can change.

I want to reassure you that your leaders are continually working to strengthen our physical security. Recently, Doug Tilton, VP House, met with our liaison at the Portsmouth Police Department to strengthen our local law enforcement connection. Doug and I also met with a local FBI agent to establish direct federal support. We continue to monitor daily briefings and updates from the Secure Community Network and have met with the

regional heads of the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) and Jewish Federation of NH. Board member Joanne Samuels has been working doggedly to secure funding from Homeland Security grants that will bring increased security measures to our building in 2024. There are many changes coming!

As you have seen, programming at TIP has increased, and attendance has been impressive. Our recent Latke-palooza was very well attended, as were the outdoor candle-lightings and other Hanukkah programs. Rabba Kaya has worked to strengthen relationships with our neighbors and other faith communities – as demonstrated in the interfaith choir's recent performance! I mention these events for a reason: As we open our building to members, and frequently, the extended community, we must maintain our security mindset.

Accordingly, this is what I ask of each of you:

1. Remember that NO credible or specific threats have targeted TIP, or our local area, but that bad actors will continue to try to disrupt Jewish services and programming.
2. Be aware that while TIP strives to be a welcoming and accessible community, it is imperative that we all pay close attention to building access. Don't hold doors open for people you don't know, but DO stop and introduce yourself and ensure that visitors are expected and escorted to their destination.

WHO enters our building is 100% within our control!

3. Consider attending an upcoming safety and security-related training. They will be announced in the weekly bulletin.

Let's keep our connections strong– and our building secure!

A Shabbat Challenge

January is a quiet month after the energy and excitement of Hanukkah. But that allows us to focus on the most precious of all Jewish holidays, Shabbat. This winter is the perfect time to try rebooting your Shabbat experience. Our weekly holiday offers many opportunities to connect with others, enjoy special foods and beverages, light candles, sing songs, and generally uplift ourselves if we choose to do so. This month, I challenge you to try a new Shabbat practice. Here are a few options:

- Bake a challah! We will offer a challah baking class on Sunday, January 7, 9:30am-12pm. Laura Sher will teach us how to make the dough, shape the loaf, and send each of us home with a freshly baked loaf and another to bake at home. We will also review the blessings to recite as we welcome Shabbat each week, and talk about other ways to make Shabbat special. Preregistration is required as space is limited.
- Light candles in your home as the night sky arrives and recite the blessings (page 4 in *Siddur Lev Shalem*).
- Use special dishes or put a tablecloth on the table for your Shabbat meal. Add flowers!
- Invite some friends over to share a festive meal. Cook a special food (perhaps kugel, brisket, cholent, or matzo ball soup) to make a Shabbat meal memorable.
- Read the parsha of the week (the section of Torah read worldwide each week). Then read a few commentaries on the parsha (many can be found online) and see if they enhance your understanding.

- Turn off your phone, take a walk in the woods or at the ocean on Shabbat, and connect with the natural world.

- Make havdalah (the end of Shabbat) on
- Saturday night by lighting a braided candle, smelling spices, and sipping wine.
- Come to a Friday night service, starting at 6pm. You can choose from these options each month:
 - An **alternative service** (using the Reform prayer book *Mishkan T'filah*) on the first Friday.
 - A **traditional service** (no instruments) on the second Friday.
 - A **Shabbes tisch (potluck dairy / vegetarian dairy meal)** on the third Friday, at which we share food, songs, and a few prayers around our dinner tables in the social hall.
- Come to an oneg after services on Friday. Bring a kosher snack to share, and get to know someone new.
- Attend a Saturday morning service, starting at 10am. Our students bring joy and youthful energy to the beginning and closing prayers. In between, we daven, hear some Torah, and learn about the week's parsha. If you would like, volunteer to help lead a service, chant some Torah or haftarah, or offer a d'var Torah.
- January 26-27 is Shabbat Shirah (Shabbat of Song). We will have special musical guests to enhance Shabbat services.

If you don't usually engage with Shabbat, give it a try. I would love to know how it goes. Send me a line or two (vp ritual@templeisraelnh.org). I will share some responses in a future column.

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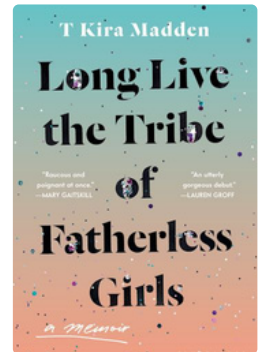

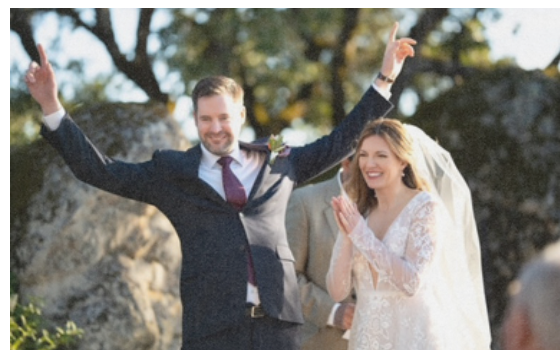
