After three and half months of war in Israel and Gaza, the headlines have shifted focus to other matters, and likely, some of our attention has also drifted away from this ongoing crisis. This is natural, as there is a kind of compassion fatigue that occurs when people are under stress for extended periods of time. Nevertheless, we cannot take our attention from this dire situation; the hostages still held for well over 100 days, the ongoing loss of so many of our brave young men and women

fighting in the IDF, the thousands of displaced families in the region, and the ongoing trauma for all Israelis and their families. Our help is still needed and we at TIP have created many avenues to offer support. You can find these resources on our Temple Israel

In Israel, the JNF has begun replanting the scarred landscape in the southern border towns where the massacres of October 7th took place. Adult B'nei Mitzvah Class

Do you want to learn how to read from the Torah? To build fluency with the prayer services, and enrich your prayer experience? To learn how to develop and deliver your own unique insights into the weekly Torah portion, in conversation with the great commentators across the generations?



Join Reb Jacob and the Adult B'nei Mitzvah class as we journey through the liturgy. We will be focusing on three areas:

1. Building service reading and leading skills (building fluency and familiarity with both the form and content of the liturgy, first by working on the key prayers, the Shema and the Amidah; learning how to chant Torah)
2. Studying the liturgy, its deeper meaning and structure
3. Developing divrei Torah: learning how to ask a good "Torah research" question, how to go about generating answers, and how then to communicate your ideas clearly

This multi-level small-group class will meet weekly (with a few exceptions), and will include homework. We will set individualized goals that fit your level, **all levels welcome**. Ask Kishka: Are these cookies kosher?

Dear Kishka,
I want to bring some cookies to share at an oneg. I read the ingredient list on the label, and they all look okay to me as far as being kosher, but there's no hekhsher on the package. Do these cookies count as kosher?
Unsure

Dear Unsure,
 That's a really good question, and it comes up a lot. **The short answer is no.** All prepared foods served at an oneg or kiddush must have a kosher certification symbol, also known as a hekhsher.
 For a prepared food to be certified kosher, it must meet a number of criteria. In simple form:

1. All the ingredients must be kosher.
2. The ingredients must not include both meat and dairy.
3. The food must not include anything that is treif (such as shellfish, pork, nonkosher meat).
4. The food must have been prepared in a kosher kitchen or other food preparation facility overseen by a rabbi, following the rules of kashrut.

It is this fourth category that confuses many people. After all, what makes a kitchen kosher?

The simple answer is that meat and dairy must be completely segregated in a kosher kitchen. All bowls, utensils, pots, pans, and baking

sheets used to prepare the food must be used solely for either dairy or meat foods. To ensure that there is no accidental contact, meat and dairy foods may not be prepared in the kosher kitchen at the same time. Counters, ovens, and stoves that are used for preparing both meat and dairy at various times must be strenuously cleaned between uses so that no cross-over of food particles occurs. All of this must be overseen by a rabbi.

So, the next time you see a package with a hekhsher, you can appreciate what that represents. Fortunately, many packaged cookies are kosher these days – you may have to look a little more closely to find the hekhsher.

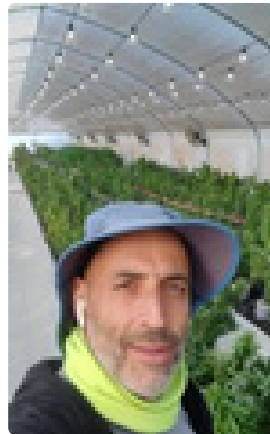

On Sunday, February 11, at 11:00 am, please join us in welcoming Israeli guest speaker, Moshe Perez. Moshe is an educator, specializing in working with students who have learning disabilities and/or ADHD. He recently volunteered with the National Search and Rescue unit of the home front command of the IDF, a unit that was tasked with cleanup of the communities surrounding Gaza. He has served in the IDF as a sergeant, platoon commander, and operations officer. As a reservist he was an infantry platoon commander in 2006 during the second Lebanon war, and in 2009, 2012, and 2014 he maneuvered infantry troops in Gaza operations. In addition to Hebrew and English, Moshe speaks fluent Arabic, Turkish, and French.

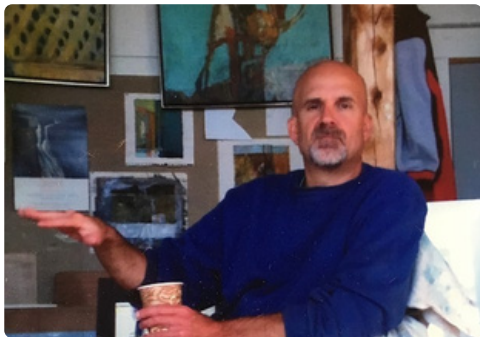

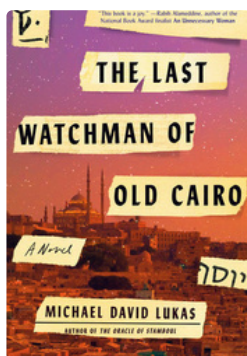
