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From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Friends.

This year we are changed. Nothing is normal. Amid the ongoing war in Israel and Gaza and the interminable pain of the hostage situation, all our rituals and prayers have justifiably taken on new meaning. For some, they have lost meaning altogether. Our tradition teaches that as the month of Adar enters, the month that contains the merriment of the holiday of Purim, one should increase their joy. Under the current circumstances, this is just not Jewishly possible.

How indeed, might we celebrate Purim, a day that lifts up pure joy and redemption, during these days of fear and grief?

Perhaps the Megillah itself can offer some guidance. In the story of Purim, once Haman's intentions

to kill all Jewish people in the land are made known, Esther is motivated to action to save her people. She is intimidated by the task before her and so turns to her people for spiritual support. She asks the people to fast and pray for her success for three days before she approaches the king. This fast, known as the Fast of Esther, takes place three days before the start of the holiday and was adopted as part of our traditional observance of Purim. This year, the Fast of Esther can take on contemporary meaning as a time dedicated for prayer on behalf of the survival of our people. I invite you to join me in a fast dedicated to a peaceful resolution to the current war and the release of the hostages.

Additionally, on Thursday, March 21, the
Fast of Esther, I will teach a class at
midday on Zoom* focusing on
contemporary Israeli and Palestinian
poetry. Together, we will read and listen to
poets' voices for peace and join our hearts in
prayer.

As we approach Purim, let us make space for our brokenness before entering into the frivolity of this holiday which celebrates a sudden reversal of fortune. And may the redemptive power of Purim energize all efforts toward justice and peace.

Adult B'nei Mitzvah Class

Do you want to learn how to read from the Torah? To build fluency with the prayer services, and enrich your prayer experience? To learn how to develop and deliver your own unique



insights into the weekly Torah portion, in conversation with the great commentators across the generations?

Join Reb Jacob and the Adult B'nei Mitzvah class as we journey through the liturgy. We will be focusing on three areas:

- 1. Building service reading and leading skills (building fluency and familiarity with both the form and content of the liturgy, first by working on the key prayers, the Shema and the Amidah; learning how to chant Torah)
- 2. Studying the liturgy, its deeper meaning and structure
- 3. Developing divrei Torah: learning how to ask a good "Torah research" question, how to go about generating answers, and how then to communicate your ideas clearly

This multi-level small-group class will meet weekly (with a few exceptions), and will include homework. We will set individualized goals that fit your level, all levels welcome. We will meet primarily on Zoom, Wednesdays from 7:30 to 8:45 pm, using the regular link for services (included in the registration confirmation email). Register via the website calendar. Ritual Committee

People of All Faiths Are Welcome at Our Services

Just as the Jewish community nationally is increasingly diverse, Temple Israel is comprised of more interfaith couples and families each year. When people of other faiths and backgrounds join us at Temple Israel for Jewish holidays and Shabbat observances, we want to be sure that they are comfortable actively participating. The list below (adapted from the USCJ "Interfaith Inclusion Guide") is provided to help everyone feel comfortable participating in services at Temple Israel, regardless of their faith or background.

In our Sabbath, weekday, and holiday services, everyone (whether or not they are Jewish) is invited to:

- Join members of the congregation as they stand and sit during services
- Sing with the congregation during communal prayers or songs
- · Wear a kippah or other head covering;
- Join the congregation in reciting responsive prayers that are read aloud
- Participate in kissing the Torah during the Torah procession
- Add a name to the list for the Prayer for Healing/mishebeirakh and/or say a name out loud during the service
- Have a loved one's name, of any faith and background, read among the names of the departed who are being remembered
- Join in the congregational recitation of the Mourner's Kaddish
- Lead congregational readings that are universal in nature, such as the Prayer for

- our Country, Prayer for Israel, and Prayer for Peace
- Come to the bimah with a Jewish spouse, partner, or child who is having an aliyah. Both

- individuals may be invited to the bimah by name in English; only the Jewish person is called in Hebrew specifically for the aliyah (honor) and only the Jewish person may recite the Torah blessings. At lifecycle events, alternate blessings may be said by the non-Jewish person in English.
- Participate in dancing and singing, including during rituals where the Torah is present (e.g., Simchat Torah)
- Dedicate a memorial plaque to a loved one
- Participate in all adult learning and family education programs/classes
- Participate in rituals at home that may be celebrated with a member of the clergy, such as affixing a mezuzah
- Be visited when ill by a member of the clergy or congregation

In our Sabbath, weekday, and holiday services, Jews are invited to:

- Count in the minyan
- Wear a tallit and/or tefillin
- Recite the blessings for an aliyah to the Torah
- Read from the Torah or chant the haftarah
- Lead a prayer service
- Carry, lift, and dress the Torah
- Carry and hold the Torah during processionals and/or dancing

Spotlight on Israel Speakers

On February 11, Moshe Perez gave a well-attended talk sponsored by the Brotherhood and the Israeli Affairs Committee. An Israeli and former IDF member, he spoke about his volunteer service in the National Search and Rescue unit of the home front command of the IDF and showed several slides of the devastation that he encountered from the October 7 Hamas attack. He also answered questions from the audience, that covered topics ranging from the increase in antisemitism to the need for education about the Middle East, to the prospect for a two-state solution.

On February 25, Jared Goldfarb, a Dover native who has lived and taught in Israel for thirty years, gave a presentation on present-day life in Israel in the midst of the war. Jared has extensive experience working with organizations that include both Israeli and Palestinian representation, such as schools, social service organizations, and peace advocacy groups. He recommended American Jewish support for those groups as an important way to foster peace between the two populations. A lively Q & A session followed.

Everyone is invited to spend a moment reading more about each individual hostage, as we keep them in our thoughts and prayers. Images will be rotated every 18 days.




TIP Book Club

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MST Scrolls Gathering

On Sunday, February 4, the Memorial Scrolls Trust (MST) in London, England held its 60th Anniversary Gathering program

at the Westminster Synagogue, the home of the MST and its museum.

The deeply moving and inspiring event included a procession of about 50 - 60 Czech Holocaust Torah scrolls from the UK, the US, and other countries at the beginning and the end of the approximately 1.5 hour program.


The same link above also provides access to 45 minutes of the Czech Scrolls Community Videos from the UK, the US, Australia and other countries. In them, many different synagogues present their MST Scrolls, and both clergy and lay representatives speak about what their Czech Holocaust Torah means to them and their communities, whether their Torah scrolls are kosher, and how and when their Torah scrolls are used in their religious services and for Holocaust education purposes. Most of the synagogues represented are Reform or Liberal. Temple Israel has not yet sent in a video to the MST about our Czech Holocaust Torah #486. We hope to do so in the coming year.

Also on the website, are remarks of Rabbi Dr.
Andrew Goldstein, Emeritus Rabbi of the
Northwood and Pinner Liberal Synagogue in
Northwood, England - which is now called the

Ark Synagogue. This appellation relates to the large, neo-gothic ark surround in the chapel of the Jewish cemetery in Kolin, Czechoslovakia (where their MST Scroll had been in a synagogue). The ark surround was saved in the early 1980s, when the Communists were going to liquidate the entire cemetery, and brought back to Northwood.

Temple Israel is the steward and guardian, on permanent loan from the MST, of Czech Holocaust Torah #486 (an orphan scroll - we don't know what town it came from), initially brought to us in 2015 by Rabbi David Senter, z"l. We have a special relationship with Jeffrey Ohrenstein, Chair of the MST, as our scroll was the first one that was loaned out by the MST after he became the chair. MST #486 has been used during lifecycle events including b'nei mitzvah ceremonies, the High Holidays, other major and minor holidays, and often during regular Shabbat services. The scroll underwent a restoration and some minor repairs in the fall of 2023 by Rabbi Sofer Kevin Hale; on completion of the repairs, he joined us for a siyyum October 25. (See the article and photos in the November 2023 issue of The Doorpost. Rabbi Sofer Hale estimates that MST #486 dates back to the 1775 era. It was already an antique when it was in use in Czechoslovakia, pre-WWII.

Starting this year, all our b'nei mitzvah celebrants will receive as a gift from the Holocaust Torah Committee, a copy of the book recently published by the MST: 1564 Scrolls: A Legacy of Jewish Life in Bohemia and Moravia.

Kol haneshama t'hallel Yah, every soul will praise the Lord. As a Jewish community, we lift our voices to sing liturgical prayers and hymns on Shabbat and holidays. This experience for many is rich and uplifting. As individuals, we find both comfort and excitement in attending concerts, as well as participating in choruses and instrumental ensembles. These activities are replenishing and fun, especially in troubling times. A composition on paper comes alive with a beautiful blending of many voices or sounds, without respect to the politics, gender, or age of the listener.

We celebrate Jewish musicians including Leonard Bernstein, world famous composer of musicals such as *West Side Story*, as well as a creator of arrangements for orchestra based on Hebrew hymns. Most are also familiar with the lyrics of Jewish musician Leonard Cohen,

especially the very moving song "Hallelujah," which includes biblical references. Israeli violinist Itzhak Perlman is admired internationally as a musical virtuoso.
